On APRIL 15, 1947 Jackie Robinson broke Major League Baseball's color line when he made his debut with the Brooklyn Dodgers. The former, four-sport athlete out of UCLA went on to become the "Rookie of the Year" in 1947, an all-star for six straight years, "Most Valuable Player" and National League batting champ in 1949, a member of the all-century team, and a member of the Major League Baseball Hall of Fame. His #42 was retired from all of Major League Baseball, and he was a World Series Champion in 1955, when the Brooklyn Dodgers won their only World Series title.

That championship was predicted by the Dorchester Lumbago League's legendary, left-handed pitcher/outfielder — the late Harry Carey, who was born on APRIL 15, 1934.
